




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Introducing LEMOCC mapping

LEMOCC mapping is part of the international project
Learning Mobility in Times of Climate Change (LEMOCC),
which explored how learning mobility can become
more climate-sensitive. The project was implemented in
2021 and 2022 together with partners from the fields of
international youth work and environmental education as
well as some public institutions in Estonia, Finland, France,
Germany, Türkiye and the United Kingdom. A partner from
China participated in part of the project. LEMOCC was
coordinated by IJAB, the International Youth Service of the
Federal Republic of Germany.

LEMOCC mapping was performed in order to obtain an overview of the participating countries, organisations and key actors that are active and relevant when it comes to sustainable youth learning mobility "in times of climate change". It collects good practices and provides insights into policies, support mechanisms and funding schemes that aim to foster climate-sensitive youth learning mobility. The overview does not claim to be complete, however, and is only intended to highlight some concrete examples and developments.

Objectives of LEMOCC mapping:

- → To provide an overview of climate-sensitive youth mobility policies, organisations and key actors in the partner countries
- → To inspire policymakers and practitioners and foster peer-to-peer learning
- > To assist in the search for partners for climate-sensitive youth mobility projects
- → To encourage new projects
- > To facilitate networking and the exchange of good practices

Scope of LEMOCC mapping

The mapping covers research at international level and in Estonia, Finland, France, Germany, Türkiye and the United Kingdom. It focuses on non-formal international learning mobility formats such as youth exchanges, volunteering and international workcamps. Some best practices concerning school education have also been included.

LEMOCC mapping starts with the chapter **International mapping** which showcases major international and European developments in the field of climate-sensitive and sustainable youth learning mobility. In the next chapter, important actors and organisations on international level are presented.

This part is followed by the country **mapping chapters**. Each chapter is structured in the same way and includes \rightarrow *Policy developments* in the respective country, followed by \rightarrow *Funding schemes and support mechanisms/structures* that foster climate-sensitive youth learning mobility.

Next, →the Main actors and organisations are described. The country chapters close with a list of →Examples of good practice from projects that foster the development of climate-sensitive youth mobility or that focus on climate protection. In some cases, examples are provided of the work of the key actors and organisations in this area, along with model-type projects of other, including small, organisations.

The final chapter outlines **resources** in English and relevant materials as well as selected national resources in the respective national languages.

The information provided in the mapping is based on research by the LEMOCC partner organisations and the mapping team at IJAB, the International Youth Service of the Federal Republic of Germany. The YouthWiki was an important source when researching policy developments and key actors.

International mapping

Climate and environmental protection has been put on the political agenda on various occasions in recent years. It is present both at international and European level, e.g., in the UN Sustainable Development Goals or the European Green Deal. This international mapping examines major international and European policy developments in this field and showcases funding schemes for climate-sensitive and sustainable youth learning mobility, mostly in the context of non-formal youth mobility.



International policy developments

The **United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC)** established an international environmental treaty to combat climate change that was signed in 1992 at the United Nations Conference on Environment and Development, also known as the Earth Summit or Rio Conference. Today, 198 countries have ratified the Convention. The **Paris Agreement** is a legally binding international treaty on climate change that was adopted by 196 countries at the United Nations Climate Change Conference (COP 21) in Paris in December 2015. Its goal is to limit global warming to well below 2, preferably 1.5 degrees Celsius.

The international community recognises the importance of education and training to address climate change. The UN Framework Convention on Climate Change, the Paris Agreement and the associated Action for Climate Empowerment agenda call on governments to educate, empower and engage all stakeholders including young people on policies and actions relating to climate change. The young generation's perspectives on the topic of climate change and sustainability are incorporated in various policy processes.

International mapping International mapping

Examples of international measures designed to involve young people in the political process:



Youth representatives are sent to international conferences such as the EU Youth Conferences, the United Nations General Assembly (UN youth delegates) or G7 youth summits to make their voices and interests heard. During the G7 youth summit in 2022, young people discussed a variety of themes including Sustainable & Green Planet and Economic Transformation for Shared Progress.



The UN Youth Advisory Group on Climate Change submits youth perspectives and concrete recommendations to the UN Secretary-General. The objective is to hear directly from young people, accelerate global climate action and drive forward progress on all 17 SDGs.



YOUNGO (YOUTH + NGO = YOUNGO) is the official children and youth constituency of the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC). It is a global network of children and youth activists (aged up to 35) as well as youth NGOs that through, e.g., its Conference of Youth events to formally bring their voices to the UNFCCC processes and shape the intergovernmental climate change policies.



The Action for Climate Empowerment Hub (ACE Hub) is a collaboration launched in 2022 between the Ministry of Economic Affairs, Industry, Climate Action and Energy of the State of North Rhine-Westphalia (NRW) and the UNFCCC Secretariat. Its objective is to increase public support to, and engagement in, climate action activities that can help accelerate the implementation of the Paris Agreement across all sectors of society. Youth is a special focus of the ACE Hub. Activities include an annual international ACE Youth Exchange and an international hackathon to develop new ideas and solutions for increasing awareness, education and participation in climate action.

The 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development was adopted by all United Nations Member States in 2015. At its heart are the 17 Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), including SDG 13 "Climate Action", which calls for urgent action to combat climate change and its impacts. In the UN SDG Good Practices platform, SDG good practices can be searched by SDGs as well as by keywords.

ESD for 2030 ("Education for Sustainable Development:

Towards achieving the SDGs") is the current global framework for the implementation of Education for Sustainable Development (ESD) between 2020 and 2030.


ESD gives learners of all ages, including young people, the knowledge, skills, values and agency they need to address interconnected global challenges including climate change. The ESD for 2030 Roadmap's priority action areas focus on climate education in schools and on empowering and mobilising youth.

UNESCO (United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organisation) is the United Nations' lead agency for ESD and is responsible for the implementation of ESD for 2030. UNESCO is a global advocate and supports governments in providing quality climate change education. UNESCO produces and shares knowledge, provides policy guidance and implements projects on the ground.

- The Greening Education Partnership helps deliver the ESD objectives and reach all learners.
- The UNESCO Associated Schools Network (ASPnet)
 connects more than 12,000 schools in 182 countries.
 It operates at international and national level. Its
 priorities are education for sustainable development,
 global citizenship education and inter-cultural and
 heritage learning.

- The Youth UNESCO Climate Action Network (YoU-CAN) was created with a view to supporting and facilitating youth-led climate action to reach its full potential and impact.
- In 2022, UNESCO published the study "Youth demands for quality climate change education" that summarises the findings of a global survey and focus group discussions about young people's learning experiences and expectations of quality climate change education, based on responses from around 17,500 young people across 166 countries.

UNICEF, the United Nations Children's Fund, works with the United Nations and its agencies to make sure that children are on the global agenda. UNICEF works with governments, partners and other UN agencies to help countries ensure the SDGs deliver results for and with every child. "Climate change and environment" is one of the UNICEF focus areas. Its global campaign "Action on the climate crisis" states that the climate crisis is a child rights crisis and calls young people, policymakers, researchers and partners to action. UNICEF gives young people the opportunity to get involved in various programmes designed to build a better future for children and young people worldwide. UNICEF sends youth delegates to the COP climate conferences to voice their opinions.



Examples of international measures targeted at young people to help implement the SDGs:

- → The Scouts for SDGs global initiative mobilises and engages young people in learning about and taking action to achieve the SDGs, including SDG 13. The initiative aims at engaging 54 million Scouts so they can make the world's largest coordinated youth contribution to the Sustainable Development Goals by 2030.
- → Global Education Week is an annual worldwide awareness-raising initiative that takes place in the third week in November. It is a call to rethink the world together and contribute to a more sustainable and equitable world. Global Education Week relates to the 17 SDGs including SDG 13 (Climate Action). It is organised by the Council of Europe's North-South Centre. The Centre develops multilateral activities responding mainly to three priority areas: global education, youth cooperation and empowerment of women.

European policy development

Environment and climate action are key priorities for the EU now and in the future.

In December 2019, the European Commission launched the European Green Deal to implement the transition to a fairer, healthier and more prosperous society whilst guaranteeing a healthy planet for future generations. It is about improving the well-being of people, making Europe climate-neutral by 2050 and protecting Europe's natural habitat. The European Green Deal recognises the key role of schools, training institutions and universities to engage with pupils, parents, and the wider community on the changes needed for a successful transition to become climate neutral by 2050. The Commission will prepare a European competence framework to help develop and assess knowledge, skills and attitudes on climate change and sustainable development.

The European Climate Pact is part of the European Green Deal and offers an opportunity for people, communities and organisations to participate in climate action across Europe. Between November 2021 and March 2022, European citizens held a total of 461 Peer Parliaments across 26 EU Member States that shared opinions and ideas on how to combat climate change. Young people aged 16-25 accounted for 24% of Peer Parliament participants, while the 26-35 age group even accounted for close to 30%. Afterwards, Peer Parliament hosts shared their findings with the European Commission, ensuring that EU policymakers heard the voices of citizens. All ideas were fed into the Conference on the Future of Europe on 9 May 2022, which was also attended by young people. Climate change and environmental protection was one of the ten conference topics.

The EU Youth Strategy is the framework for EU youth policy cooperation for 2019-2027. It fosters youth participation in democratic life and wants to connect, engage and empower young people. During a dialogue process in 2017 and 2018, which involved young people from all over Europe, 11 European Youth Goals were developed, including Youth Goal #10, Sustainable Green Europe. The EU Youth Dialogue is a dialogue mechanism between young people and decision-makers under the EU Youth Strategy. It wants to ensure that the opinions, views and needs of young people and youth organisations are considered when defining the EU's youth policies. The dialogue with policy-makers and other activities happen in 18-month work cycles. Each cycle focuses on a different theme that is set by the Council of Youth Ministers. The current cycle from early 2022 to mid-2023



is headed "Engaging together for a sustainable and inclusive Europe" and is directly connected to Youth Goals #3, Inclusive Societies and #10, Sustainable Green Europe. The results of the dialogue are compiled, discussed and fed back into EU youth policy.

The European Year of Youth 2022 wanted to shine a light on the importance of European youth to build a better future that is greener, more inclusive and digital. The Voice Platform of the European Year of Youth 2022 collected voice messages by young people telling the European Union what kind of Europe they want to live in. In the "Green" category, ideas for a greener Europe were collected. During the European Year of Youth, the European Commission and the High Representative adopted the Youth Action Plan in the European Union external action for 2022-2027, the first policy framework for a strategic partnership with young people around the world to build a more resilient, inclusive and sustainable future. It will help deliver on international commitments. such as the United Nations' 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and the Paris Climate Agreement, by enhancing meaningful youth participation and empowerment in the EU's external action policies.

In January 2022, the EU published a proposal for a Council Recommendation on learning for environmental sustainability.

In 2022, the European Commission set up a new SALTO centre on green transition and sustainable transition in Erasmus+ and the European Solidarity Corps. It is hosted by the French Erasmus+ Education and Training National Agency and will support national agencies in Europe and their Erasmus+ and European Solidarity Corps project leaders on issues related to the transition towards more and quality education on sustainable development and eco-friendly practices.

Funding schemes

The Erasmus+ Programme is the EU's programme to support education, training, youth and sport in Europe. Erasmus+ offers mobility and cooperation opportunities in higher education, vocational education and training, school education, adult education, youth and sport. One of the priorities of the Erasmus+ programme is "Environment and fight against climate change". Erasmus+ wants to be a key instrument for building knowledge, skills, and attitudes on climate change and supporting sustainable development both within the European Union and beyond. Environment and the fight against climate change have become a horizontal priority for the selection of projects. Erasmus+ Youth offers specific mobility opportunities for all young people in the field of non-formal and informal education. It supports international youth exchanges, mobility projects for youth workers, youth participation activities and DiscoverEU. DiscoverEU offers young people aged 18 the opportunity to enjoy a short-term individual or group experience travelling across Europe by rail or other modes of transport where necessary. As an informal learning activity, DiscoverEU aims at fostering a sense of belonging to the European Union, inspiring participants to embrace sustainable travel in particular and an environmental conscience in general. In the Erasmus+ Projects Platform Erasmus+ project descriptions can be searched by country and theme, e. g. "Youth", "Environment and climate change" or "Green transport and mobility".

The European Solidarity Corps (ESC) Programme is the EU's programme to bring together young people to build a more inclusive society, support vulnerable individuals and respond to societal and humanitarian challenges. It promotes cross-border and local activities that benefit the community and that build a solidary and social Europe. One of the priorities of the ESC is environmental protection, sustainable development, and climate action. In the ESC Projects Platform, ESC project descriptions can be searched by country and theme, e. g. "Climate action", "Environment and nature protection" or "Green skills".

The European Union's DEAR (Development Education and Awareness Raising) programme supports projects that engage Europeans in worldwide issues around social, economic and environmental development. It promotes active citizenship and a critical understanding of sustainable development issues, the interdependent world and people's roles as change-makers. The programme also provides funding for international projects for young people on sustainability and environmental protection and has trained 35,000 teachers in global development issues. In the DEAR Projects Platform DEAR project descriptions can be searched by country, participant group and keyword.

The LIFE Programme is the European Commission's financial instrument to fund environmental and climate projects across the EU. It is the only instrument aimed directly at the environment that supports the development and implementation of the Union's environmental policy. LIFE wants to contribute to sustainable development, the achievement of the Europe 2020 objectives and targets, and the relevant EU environmental and climate strategies and plans. In the LIFE Public Database LIFE project descriptions can be searched by keyword.

The United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP)'s mission is to inform, enable and inspire nations and peoples to improve their quality of life without compromising that of future generations. For example, UNEP runs the World Environment Day campaign which engages millions of people from across the world to protect the planet and start environmental action. Earth School was co-created by UNEP and Ted-Ed to provide children, parents and teachers all over the world with engaging nature-focused content to stay connected to nature during the global COVID-19 pandemic.

The Earth Prize is a global environmental sustainability competition for young people aged 13 to 19, with a prize fund of \$200,000 to reward teams whose projects have the greatest potential to address environmental challenges and sustainable development. The Earth Prize recognises the students and schools with the best solutions for accelerating positive change towards environmental sustainability. The Earth Prize is funded by the Earth Foundation. Its goal is to inspire, educate, mentor and empower students, schools, researchers and young entrepreneurs with innovative ideas to tackle environmental challenges.

Important actors and organisations

This chapter presents a number of important international actors and organisations. For national key actors and organisations, please refer to the country mapping chapters. Note that there are many more important organisations, so this list should not be considered exhaustive.



Erasmus Student Network (ESN)

One of the objectives of the Erasmus Student Network (ESN) is to contribute to sustainable development and environmental sustainability through learning mobility and civic engagement. Local ESN associations organise environmental sustainability activities. Green Erasmus is a project coordinated by ESN and other higher education institutions that seeks to improve the environmental sustainability of the Erasmus+ programme. Green Erasmus has launched the Green Erasmus survey, co-funded by the Erasmus+ programme. The Green Erasmus Portal provides students with tips and tricks to act sustainably before, during and after their Erasmus experience. As part of the Green Erasmus project, the petition "Increase support for green travel in Erasmus+" was launched to ask the EU institutions for more funding for sustainable travel. The Green Erasmus research project on the habits of Erasmus students looks at consumption, daily life and travel habits of Erasmus students from the perspective of their environmental attitudes and beliefs.

ESD Expert Net

ESD Expert Net brings together education experts from different fields in a global partnership. They promote international dialogue on education for sustainable development and develop international approaches and strategies. It implements Go! Global, a virtual international school exchange programme which helps pupils share their practical experience related to the 17 SDGs, for example school gardening and food production or waste disposal and recycling.

The Foundation for Environmental Education is one of the world's largest environmental education organisations, with over 100 member organisations in 81 countries. Its strategic plan GAIA 20:30 prioritises climate action across all its educational programmes to address climate change,

biodiversity loss and environmental pollution. Its global educational programmes Eco-Schools, Learning About Forests and Young Reporters for the Environment empower young people to create an environmentally conscious world through a solutions-based approach. Eco-Schools is the largest global sustainable schools programme.

Fridays for Future

Fridays for Future is a youth-led and -organised global climate strike movement that started in August 2018, when 15-year-old Greta Thunberg began a school strike for climate. Today, Fridays for Future is a social movement that is active on national and international level. It fights for comprehensive, fast and effective climate protection measures in order to achieve compliance with the 1.5°C climate target. In 2019 the movement organised Global Week for Future, a series of 4,500 strikes across over 150 countries. It also organises climate activism around international political events such as COP World Climate Conferences.

Generation Climate Europe

Generation Climate Europe (GCE) is a coalition of youth-led networks on climate and environmental issues at the European level that incorporates 381 national organisations across 46 European countries. Its working groups engage young people and offer them the opportunity to play an active role in EU decision-making and be heard on climate and environmental issues. There are working groups on, e.g., sustainable development, climate justice and clean mobility.

Green 10

Green 10 is a coalition of ten of the largest environmental organisations and networks in Europe that works to ensure that the European Union protects the climate, the local environment, biodiversity and human health within and beyond its borders.

International Forum for Volunteering in Development

The International Forum for Volunteering in Development (Forum) is a global network of organisations that work with volunteers to achieve sustainable development goals. Its members can take part in a range of working groups and communities of practice including on climate action. The Forum Climate Action Group was established to inform, spur action among and provide practical advice to Forum members on climate issues. In 2020, Forum organised its annual conference for international volunteer cooperation organisations (IVCO) as a virtual conference on volunteering for climate action. Several papers have been published to explore the connection between volunteering and climate action.

International Young Naturefriends (IYNF)

International Young Naturefriends (IYNF) is an international organisation bringing together Young Naturefriends and their organisations across Europe. IYNF organises various activities on climate protection and the SDGs and promotes young people's active participation in social life. IYNF is also a training and exchange provider organising international youth exchanges and capacity building activities for the benefit of its members. Its exchanges and training activities focus on its core fields environmental education, outdoor programming and amateur art. IYNF also produces methodological publications and runs information campaigns.

Yes to Sustainability

Yes to Sustainability is a network of young people and youth workers whose aim is to bring together young people in ecovillages and sustainable projects in Europe. The networks organises international youth exchanges and international mobility activities for youth workers such as training courses and seminars. These activities are funded by the European Union's Erasmus+ programme. Yes to Sustainability also offers support and mentoring to ecovillages, networks, sustainable projects and young people wishing to organise an international youth exchange.

World Organisation of the Scout Movement (WOSM)

The World Organisation of the Scout Movement is a confederation of over 170 national Scout organisations. Scouts are engaged in sustainability and climate action and are committed to protecting, preserving and restoring the planet. WOSM's World Triennial Plan 2021-2024 is centred around the theme of recovery and sustainability. Scouts across the globe have completed thousands of environment-related projects under the World Scout Environment Programme. In 2020 WOSM launched a reshaped environmental education programme called Earth Tribe, whose thematic focus is on biodiversity conservation, plastic waste prevention and climate-friendly solar energy.

Policy developments

According to the Sustainable Development Reports for 2021 and 2022, Estonia ranks 10 out of 193 UN Member States when comparing progress on implementing the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and its Sustainable Development Goals. The Strategy for Estonian Development Cooperation and Humanitarian Aid 2016–2020 mentions, amongst several other goals, Estonian development cooperation to foster environmentally friendly development and raising awareness of the Estonian public, particularly younger people, of development cooperation, humanitarian aid and global development problems. Although the strategy ended in 2020, the activities are to be implemented until 2023.

According to Prime Minister Kaja Kallas, climate-related topics are a key priority for the Estonian government and there is a clear intention to achieve the European climate neutrality objective by 2050. As an EU Member State, Estonia is also committed to the European Green Deal.

In Estonia, **climate protection** is a cross-cutting topic involving several ministries and governmental organisations. Key stakeholders here are the Estonian Ministry of Education and Research, the Education and Youth Board, the Ministry of the Environment, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and the Environmental Board.

- The Ministry of Education and Research and the Education and Youth Board published a joint report "Is the Estonian young person a world citizen?" (Kas Eesti noor on maailmakodanik?) that analyses the results of the OECD Pisa 2018 survey for Estonia. The PISA 2018 survey examined, among other things, young people's attitudes to global issues. The report reveals that Estonian young people are quite aware of global issues. The most prominent topics were climate change and gender equality.
- The Ministry of the Environment commissions regular surveys on public environmental awareness. The last survey was realised in 2020. The surveys show, for

example, that in the 15-29 age group, 23% of respondents are often or almost all the time concerned about environmental problems. In 2019 a Youth Environment Council was established at the Ministry of the Environment. The Youth Environment Council is both an advisory and decision-making body that represents the environmental interests of young people and youth organisations both locally and internationally. The Council aims to involve young people in environmental debates and policymaking. It has participated in many working groups at the Ministry of the Environment, provided input for environmental legislation and contributed to the environmental education of young people. One of the Council's major ongoing projects is the provision of training courses on environmental issues in schools, which give students new knowledge and broadens their horizons.

- In 2020, the Ministry of Education and Research and the Ministry of Foreign Affairs in cooperation with Estonian and foreign experts published a report entitled Global Education in Estonia, which showed that a rising number of young people are interested in climate change. There are more and more groups of young people protesting against the lack of national efforts to combat climate change.
- The Environmental Board is a government agency affiliated with the Ministry of the Environment. It is responsible for fostering a sense of responsibility among the people of Estonia in regard to nature, and offers environmental education programmes.

In 2021, the Estonian Government formed an expert group known as the Green Policy Steering Committee to coordinate the implementation of green policies in Estonia. The Key Principles of Climate Policy until 2050 are the basis of Estonian climate policy. One of the policies is to raise public awareness of climate change mitigation. Knowledge, skills and attitudes will be promoted at all levels of education including non-formal environmental education.

Estonia Estonia

The main governmental authority responsible for **youth policy** is the Ministry of Education and Research, specifically its Youth and Talent Policy Department. In order to implement an integrated youth policy, all ministries must take into account the specific needs of young people.

The youth sector development plan for 2021-2035 (Noortevaldkonna arengukava 2021-2035 (in Estonian) / Youth Sector Development Plan (in English) also mentions the European Youth Goals, international youth work, youth volunteering and environmental aspects. The Ministry of Education and Research and the Ministry of the Environment are already collaborating to implement an environmental education and awareness action plan that will increase cooperation between these fields and raise awareness of environmental issues.

The Government Office is responsible for coordinating the preparation, implementation and amendment of the strategy "Estonia 2035" in cooperation with the Ministry of Finance. The goals were agreed at discussions that took place across Estonia over a period of two years, and reflect the outcomes of a survey (to which almost 17,000 people responded). The Estonian National Youth Council (ENL) is helping to draft the Estonia 2035 strategy document and in doing so, represents the positions of young Estonians.

Funding schemes and support mechanisms/structures

Archimedes Foundation

The Archimedes Foundation is an independent body established by the Estonian government in 1997 with the objective to coordinate and implement international and national programmes and projects in the field of training, education, research, technological development and innovation. The Archimedes Foundation offers a database listing Estonian projects realised under the main funding programmes such as Erasmus+ and the European Solidarity Corps. The project data-

base includes projects on environmental protection and climate change. There is also a collection of examples of good practices.

Education and Youth Board (Harno)

The Education and Youth Board (Harno) is an agency within the Ministry of Education and Research that deals with the implementation of Estonian education and youth policy. Harno was established in 2020, and its portfolio of services is a continuation of those previously provided by Foundation Innove, the Archimedes Foundation and the Information Technology Foundation for Education and Estonian Youth Work Center.

Harno's youth department promotes the implementation of quality youth policy and organises and develops Estonian youth work services. Its youth information website www.teeviit.ee carries information on environment and consumption as well as on international opportunities.

The National Agency for Erasmus+ Youth in Action and the European Solidarity Corps (ESC) in Estonia is part of Harno. It oversees funding apportioned in Estonia, manages the programmes in Estonia and is responsible for programme communication. Erasmus+ and the ESC provide a considerable number of opportunities for young Estonians in the environment and sustainable development fields. The National Agency also functions as the Eurodesk office in Estonia.

Harno's internationalisation department coordinates international cooperation and scholarship programmes for study and work abroad, as well as scholarship programmes for study and research at Estonian universities

The Next Step is a competition funded by the Ministry of Education and Research and the Education and Youth Board. The Foundation Environmental Investments Centre (EIC) is an independent body established by the government under the Ministry of Finance. It is responsible for mediating state budget funds, EU funds, funds from foreign aid programmes and the Green Investment Scheme and for granting loans for environmental projects. Funded projects can be searched in Estonian language in a project database, which includes, among others, projects funded by the EU Structural Funds or under the Environment Programme. 



Policy developments

According to reports published in 2021 and 2022 (Europe Sustainable Development Report 2021 and 2022, Sustainable Development Report 2021 The Decade of Action for the Sustainable Development Goals) Finland is at the top of the list when comparing progress on implementing the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and its Sustainable Development Goals in European countries.

Finland has a National Commission on Sustainable Development, chaired by the Prime Minister. Its mandate is to ensure that the international sustainable development goals are included in national policy.

In 2016, rather than draw up a traditional strategy, the National Commission on Sustainable Development decided to prepare a commitment to sustainable development entitled "The Finland we want by 2050". In this document the public administration, together with other actors, pledges to promote sustainable development in all its work. The document lists eight objectives including sustainable local communities, a zero-carbon society, life choices that respect nature's boundaries, and decision-making that respects nature.

In 2017 a Finnish Agenda 2030 Youth Group was set up under the Finnish National Commission on Sustainable Development led by the Prime Minister. The Commission saw the need to increase youth participation in the national planning and implementation of the Agenda 2030, which led to the idea of providing a platform for young people interested in sustainable development. The Agenda 2030 Youth Group has two aims: to serve as an advocate for the goals, and to participate in the national planning and implementation of the Sustainable Development Goals. The Youth Group is invited to various stakeholder meetings in the ministries and attends workshops, discussions and events on sustainable development. It is composed of 20 people aged 15 to 28 from all over Finland and with a variety of backgrounds. The Agenda 2030 Youth Group and UN Youth,

together with 50 other youth organisations, submitted a written statement to the Finnish government on the reform of the Climate Act.

Sustainability and eco-social approaches are part of the curriculum guidelines at all school levels in Finland, from early to higher education. Sustainability is not a school subject but a cross-cutting competence that is mainstreamed in all school subjects. Consequently, sustainability is present for young people from an early age; they also engage on it in their spare time and in the non-formal sector.

Funding schemes and support mechanisms/structures

The Ministry of Education and Culture is a key player in the field of youth policy. It allocates funding to youth organisations and the national youth centres in accordance with the Youth Act (2017). To apply for state aid, these organisations must follow the core values of the Youth Act and support their realisation. These core values are respect for life and the environment, sustainable development, solidarity, multiculturalism, internationalism, healthy lifestyles, and cross-sectoral cooperation. Under the Youth Act, international youth work activities may also receive funding from the annual state budget. The national youth centres are explicitly referred to in the Act as key players for promoting international orientation for young people and sustainable development.

The Finnish National Agency for Education (EDUFI) is the National Agency for Erasmus+ Youth in Action and the European Solidarity Corps in Finland. EDUFI oversees funding apportioned in Finland, manages the programmes in Finland and is responsible for programme communication. Besides that its core tasks are to develop education and training, early childhood education and lifelong learning and to promote internationalisation in Finland. The European Solidarity Corps programme supports youth volunteering and solidarity projects, among other things. The National Agency also functions as the Eurodesk office in Finland.

Main actors and organisations

Finnish Youth Centres Association - LEMOCC partner

The Finnish Youth Centres Association ensures cooperation among the country's nine youth centres. Each year, it organises approximately 750 camp schools, 500 hobby-themed or other camps and 150 international youth events.

The Finnish Youth Centres Association develops the educational work at the youth centres, which offer a safe and responsible environment for camps, courses, training sessions, nature schools and other events throughout the year. It is Finland's most popular school camp organiser, with an emphasis on experiential learning and adventure education. International activities are part of the core mission of the youth centres. Likewise it is their intention to improve young people's opportunities for internationalisation and international mobility. In all nine youth centres, Finnish nature is seen as a learning environment. They are all situated very close to nature. One of the ethical principles of the Association is sustainable development: all activities are based on respecting the environment.

Allianssi, the Finnish National Youth Council, is a national service provider and advocacy organisation for the youth sector. It is a lobbying organisation with no political or religious affiliation. Its membership consists of over 140 national youth and educational organisations.

Allianssi Youth Exchanges

Allianssi Youth Exchanges is a non-profit and non-governmental body. It promotes intercultural learning and global understanding through a wide variety of international mobility programmes.

It cooperates closely with international partners to offer interesting programmes for learning, volunteering, training or working in different countries. Most participants are between 18 and 30.

The organisation participates in various strategic partnership projects in Europe and globally and takes part in youth worker mobility projects, youth exchanges, trainings and others. They are open to working with new partners, and are also open to different and new topics that young people are interested in.

4H Finland

4H arranges leisure activities for children and young people between the ages of 6 and 28. There are almost 200 local 4H associations in Finland. 4H is an international organisation through which young people can learn about the world for themselves, take part in an

and courses organised by 4H.

The main source of funding for local 4H activities is the Ministry of Agriculture and Forestry. Additional resources come from fundraising, project funding and municipal grants and service provisions.

4H initiates concrete actions for organisations that wish to tackle climate change, i.e., seedling planting.

The Guides and Scouts of Finland want to reach carbon neutrality in their activities by 2030. This requires action at national, regional and local level. Sustainability is a key issue in their large events. The local groups, which mainly consist of volunteers, can evaluate their activities and improve them with the help of a certificate known as Kestävästi partiossa, or Sustainable Scouting.

Tampere University - LEMOCC partner


Tampere University is one of the most multidisciplinary universities in Finland. Almost all internationally recognised fields of study are represented. During the last few years, Tampere University has invested in developing environmental and sustainability education. Two new positions were funded: a professorship in environmental education and a university lecturer position in environmental education and sustainable development. More research and courses in this field will be available in the future.

WWF organised its first camp in Finland in 1977 in Linnansaari National Park. Since 1978, five to six weeklong work camps have been organised for hundreds of volunteers every summer in different parts of the country. In addition, at least two weekend camps are organised every summer in Finland. Young people can participate by maintaining cultural landscapes, joining volunteer-based invasive species programmes or running water maintenance projects. They can also join volunteer oil spill response teams or one of the WWF youth groups that exist in the biggest cities. In addition, WWF encourages schools and youth groups to arrange their own work events for nature.

Furthermore, WWF Finland produces information and takes environmental education into schools. They provide learning materials and in-service teacher training on environmental and sustainability issues. They encourage young people to act for the natural world.

Description: "ALL-YOUTH – All youth want to rule their world" is a multidisciplinary research project which explores the capacities of young people (aged between 16 and 25) and the obstacles to their engagement with society. The researchers also explore young people's visions regarding sustainable future, growth and well-being.

The main goal of the project is to create opportunities for young people to participate in shaping their own communities and society. The key ideas for sustainable growth are responsive governance and rule of law, digital innovation and sustainable development interventions such as bioeconomy.

The project consists of five subprojects. The fifth is entitled "Creating Sustainable Well-Being". It tests solutions created with young people and by other subprojects and explores how young people can support sustainable well-being and what the potential is for them to be employed in sustainable development.

Description: "Kajo" is the name of the eighth Finnjamboree which was organised by the Guides and Scouts of Finland on July 15-23, 2022. Approximately 15,000 Finnish and international guides and scouts aged 12 and up gathered at the Evo campsite. They could participate either as a participant or as an International Service Team member. The goals of Kajo were to

- create new ways of organising sustainable public events

- be accessible for as many people as possible
- be a shared, unique and international guiding and scouting experience
- guide its participants towards making sustainable choices.

The organisers of Kajo worked with partners to develop new ways to make large scouting events more sustainable. Ecological sustainability is not the only aspect of sustainability. Kajo was designed to be more sustainable than previous events also in social, economic and cultural terms. Lessons learned during the project were actively shared with others so they can be applied when planning future camps and other events.

Responsibility and accountability have always been a part of scouting, but in scouting today it is practically a requirement. Scouts can be role models when it comes to organising a large-scale event in a responsible way. Responsible choices means those that help take everyone towards the United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals. It was important that everyone at Kajo developed an idea of what responsible choices are and why it is important to make them.

Plastic is not Fantastic

Policy developments

France ranks seventh in the SDG index of the Sustainable Development Report 2022. In line with its international commitment to and mobilisation of sustainable development, France has committed to the national implementation of the Sustainable Development Goals. By drawing up a roadmap, France reaffirmed this commitment at both national and international level. The roadmap was elaborated in consultation with all stakeholders. A committee of stakeholders (ministries, parliamentarians, civil society) coordinated the elaboration as well as the mobilisation of all communities. The roadmap was adopted on 20 September 2019. The Ministry of Ecological Transition is responsible for preparing and implementing government policy in the fields of sustainable development, climate, energy transition and biodiversity.

Other ministries (Ministry of National Education and Youth; Ministry of Foreign Affairs), associations, and international and non-governmental organisations are engaged in international development, international solidarity and education for sustainable development. By creating projects and launching policies, young people are given the opportunity to develop an interest in the global issues and challenges of tomorrow.

The field of non-formal education plays an important role in this context. Associations working in the field of international solidarity inform about global issues. They work together with public institutions and ministries and run programmes for young people (international travel and volunteering).

Local education authorities (which are decentralised departments of the Ministry of National Education) are encouraged to organise events and debates on sustainable development and climate change and run educational projects and scientific workshops on these topics. These take place in particular in cooperation with local stakeholders that are involved in sustainable development and environmental education.

Besides non-formal learning, formal education also has an important role to play in discussing global issues and making young people aware of issues such as global warming, developmental inequalities between countries, and international cooperation in the first place.

Education for sustainable development is included in primary and secondary school curricula. It is mainstreamed across all school subjects throughout the different stages of schooling. It is a major theme which is tackled in an interdisciplinary and cross-cutting way, involving subjects such as development and international solidarity education, health education and cultural

Under the heading "Engaging together for a green and inclusive Europe", during its EU Council Presidency France worked on two Youth Goals (#10 "Green Europe" and #3 "Inclusive societies"). France, especially the French Ministry of Education, Youth and Sport, as well as Cnajep (the French Youth Council), was particularly committed to the "green" and sustainable youth topic during the Presidency as well as under its Trio Presidency.

In April 2022, the Council of Ministers adopted conclusions to foster engagement of young people as actors of change in order to protect the environment as well as a recommendation on the mobility of young volunteers across the European Union.

Funding schemes and support mechanisms/structures

The European and international mobility of young people in France has become an important issue for public action. It is included in the political agenda at all territorial levels.

Since the outbreak of the COVID pandemic, young people's mobility has been restricted in many countries. Faced with this situation, the French government has placed education, vocational training, apprenticeships, international mobility and the civic engagement of

young people at the heart of its policy. In this context, the Ministry of Europe and Foreign Affairs (MEAE) encourages local authorities to expand and strengthen decentralised cooperation that is developed by and for young people.

Youth Calls) aimed at local authorities. It encourages collaboration between French and foreign local authorities so they can run cooperation projects in the fields of culture, sustainable development, education, youth and economic development. Since 2015, 108 projects have been funded, enabling the mobility of around 2,000 young people and education/training professionals.

MEAE also launched the City Life Holiday/International Solidarity (Ville, Vie, Vacances/Solidarité Internationale) (VVV/SI) programme in 1991 and the JSI - Youth, International Solidarity (Jeunesse, Solidarité Internationale) programme in 1997. They aim to enable young French people (aged 15-25) to meet, exchange and act together with their peers from partner countries; to promote collective, solidarity-based and sustainable activities; to encourage youth organisations to act in favour of peace, social cohesion, the involvement of young people in local communities, and the democratisation of societies.

The French Ministry of Education and Youth (MENJ), with the help of youth organisations, launched a scheme to support young people's creativity and capacity for action. The call for Young Eco-Committed projects was aimed at all young Europeans or EU residents aged 18 to 30, either individually or in groups of two to five people. 55 proposals were submitted, involving 117 participants from 15 EU Member States. Following a pre-selection, 14 finalist projects, involving 39 participants from seven European countries (Belgium, France, Germany, Italy, Portugal, Spain and Sweden) were selected to present their projects to a jury and the audience at a European Youth Conference. Five projects were awarded prizes at the informal meeting of European Ministers for Youth Education. All awards went to green and ecological projects and the winners received a prize of €10,000.

The Youth Ministry encourages young French people aged between 12 and 18 who want to take concrete action in favour of the environment and has launched a call for projects for 100,000 young people by the name of Young Nature Experiences. The topics are biodiversity, agriculture, landscape and forestry. The projects Every year MEAE launches calls for projects (known as differ by type and range from nature playgrounds, forest and nature schools to social and voluntary services and forest projects and thus appeal also to younger children and young people aged 25 and under. The winning associations offer all interested young people to take part in outdoor activities in France throughout 2022.

> This is not a permanent funding scheme, but a momentary opportunity, although it can be observed that calls for sustainable and environmental activities are becoming more frequent in France.

> Call for proposals are published regularly by the Franco-German Youth Office (FGYO). Within the framework of the call "The planet in your hands", a total of 20 projects were supported in 2021 that focused on the climate/environment/sustainability theme and had a Franco-German or multilateral dimension. A list of all 20 funded projects is available on the FGYO website.

> The Erasmus+ Youth and Sport agency is part of the Civic Service Agency. It is in charge of managing the European Solidarity Corps, the youth section of the Erasmus+ programme and the activities of its sport section. It finances activities run by young people or public or private organisations through calls for projects.

> The Civic Service Agency, which oversees youth volunteering missions, also organises eco-volunteering missions with an environmental protection aspect. A number of them focus on raising citizens' awareness of and lending support to their eco-responsible initiatives, as well as raising awareness of water-related environmental actions.

Main actors and organisations

Association de Développement du Haut-Cabardes (ADHC): Les jardiniers de la mobilité

The mission of this organisation is to help young people to find their place in society, to grasp life's challenges and to learn about opportunities for mobility abroad. It supports young people in the region to access the opportunities offered by the European Commission through the Erasmus+ programme. It has already sent many volunteers abroad as part of the European Voluntary Service: Italy, Slovakia, Poland, Bulgaria, Peru, Nepal and Brazil are some of the destinations offered. At regional level, they organise youth exchanges and offer training and animation activities focused on non-formal learning. Recurring themes of the youth exchanges are environment, sustainable development, climate and mobility.


Une Terre Culturelle (UTC)

UTC maintains partnerships with French and foreign institutions in Germany, Algeria, Armenia, Bosnia-Herzegovina, Italy, North Macedonia, Morocco, Tunisia, Türkiye, Russia and many other countries, with whom projects are jointly designed, respecting the principle of exchange and reciprocity.

I draw my green Europe / Je dessine mon Europe verte

Description: "I draw my green Europe" is a programme launched by CIDJ in cooperation with the French Youth Information Network to raise awareness of and engage young people in a dialogue about citizenship and environmental issues in a fun and participatory way. It offers four activities: a comic strip competition for young people aged 15 to 25, an event on Europe Day on the commitment of young people to a green Europe, a web series with young people who talk about their commitment, give tips and inspire, and an exhibition. The programme was part of France's Council Presidency in 2022 and the European Year of Youth. It was supported by the European Parliament.

The comic strip competition drew high-quality contributions from participants nationwide. The four winners' comic strips are shown in an online exhibition. The May Day event, which took place in the highly symbolic Paris Climate Academy, offered a series of online and face-to-face activities for young people and professionals. The round table and the Live Twitch session gave the floor to young activists as well as MEPS and professionals. Les villages des jeunes

Project: International camp

Description: In the heart of the Alps, the organisation "Les Villages des Jeunes" has been managing, livening up and renovating the reception centre of Vaunières since1964. It is an old mountain hamlet, now a "springboard" place for young people and adults experiencing family, health or professional difficulties, and who need to take some time to recharge, acquire new skills and reflect on their plans. The workcamps that are organised in Vaunières with volunteers from all over the world help to strengthen the cultural diversity of their activities and to make this site open to the world, a place where people of all ages and all social and cultural backgrounds can meet to work together and live as a community.

One of Vaunières' key aims is to reduce the environmental impact. The daily question is: What to do with waste? The youth exchange aims to allow participants to reflect on the five-R waste policy: Refuse, Reduce, Reuse, Recycle, Rot. Participants were invited to join activities around zero waste, namely the creation of natural products, meetings with local stakeholders (local producers, resource centres...), cooking workshops around this theme, and the construction of objects and furniture from recycled materials. Apart from its "zero waste" theme, this exchange was also an opportunity to meet people from different countries with varied backgrounds.

The witches' claws

Project: International camp

Countries: France and volunteers from all over the world

Description: This international camp is organised in partnership with Syndicat mixte Rivage and the town of Barcarès, on the edge of the Salses Leucate pond, in a protected wetland that is renowned for its varied biodiversity. The partnership between Syndicat mixte Rivage and REV has existed for several years. The syndicate collaborates regularly with REV on the organisation of international worksites or other occasional events. In addition to removing invasive species (witches' claw, yucca, prickly pears, agaves, etc.), This year's project aimed to help implement measures for the protection and enhancement of existing biodiversity on the site (e.g., trail layout). Since the work is linked to weather conditions, tasks are generally defined at the start of the project. Activities are in accordance with Sustainable Development Goals 14 and 15 of the UN (protection of aquatic and terrestrial fauna and flora). The site allowed for carrying out several activities: clearing sites (cutting down trees), delimiting the protected area of the site frequented by kite surfers, for example (installing wooden barriers), uprooting invasive species in order to allow endemic flora and fauna to reproduce. The aim of the project is to preserve the surroundings of the pond, whether by managing human use or plant growth.

Waste my love / Déchet mon amour

Project: International youth exchange

Organisations: Une Terre Culturelle (France)

Description: In October 2021, a group of young people (aged 15 to 17) from France, Greece, Latvia and Spain carried out a joint project on waste management in Cassis, France. Environmental protection was also a topic. The programme was designed to alternate non-formal educational activities and environmental awareness-raising with playful activities.

For example, the group visited the Ressourcerie d'Aubagne, where discarded or donated items are collected to give them a second life and resell them. The young people learned how the institution works. In a workshop, they learned how to make a bag out of an old t-shirt.

The young people also took part in a workshop on collecting waste by the city of Aubagne. The workshop was designed to make the young people aware of waste separation and the protection of the natural places that surround them. The mayor also introduced them to the environmental and youth-related projects of the city of Aubagne.

The group went to La Ciotat to visit Le Mentaure, a methanation plant located on a former landfill site, where energy is produced from waste.

Water carriers / Porteurs d'eau

Description: Since 2014, the IFKER Association for Environmental Education and Sustainable Development, in partnership with the association Cool'eurs du Monde, has been organising youth exchange projects which promote the development of active citizenship and interculturality between Morocco and France. This is facilitated by the fact that IFKER is accredited by the EU to host and send European and Moroccan young people.

15 young people (eight French, seven Moroccan) from diverse socio-cultural backgrounds and different locations committed themselves to carrying out a Franco-Moroccan collaborative project entitled "Water carriers" (July 2019). The aim was to enhance the cultural and natural heritage, namely the large historical gates of the Zerhoun villages and the water sources of the territory, a true common heritage.

The work of the young people led to the creation of an exhibition of about fifty photographic portraits in the visitor centre of the archaeological site of Volubilis (Morocco), which was visited

by more than 5,000 people. The young people also combined their experiences and skills to produce a documentary film on the landscape and cultural features of the area that raised awareness among the local population of the importance of preserving this heritage as a vector for sustainable development.

Policy developments

According to the Sustainable Development Report 2022, Germany ranks 6th out of 163 countries in the SDG

Numerous governmental and non-governmental organisations and institutions in Germany deal with the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals and/or the concept of Education for Sustainable Development. With regard to the combination of the concerns of young people, their mobility habits and climate change, an important actor at national level is the Federal Ministry for Family Affairs, Senior Citizens, Women and Youth (Bundesministerium für Familie, Senioren, Frauen und Jugend, or BMFSFJ).

The focus of Germany's Sustainable Development Strategy transcends national borders. It has also been connected with the UN's 17 Sustainable Development Goals since 2016. Under the chairmanship of the Head of the Chancellery, all ministries and the State Secretaries' Committee for Sustainable Development participated in the development of Germany's Sustainable Development Strategy between 2019 and 2021. Comments from the public received during an online consultation by the Federal Government's Press and Information Office were also included, as were position statements received from the Sustainability Forum, to which the Chancellor's Office invites leading sustainability stakeholders every year.

The Federal Government will continue to pursue the strategy and its implementation with the involvement of all relevant social stakeholders. A comprehensive review and update of the strategy is scheduled for 2023/2024.

Youth policy-making takes place at different levels. At national level, it is the responsibility of the Federal Ministry for Family Affairs, Senior Citizens, Women and Youth. The Ministry is responsible for encouraging and supporting youth policy (and child and youth services) activities.

The cooperation between public and non-public institutions and organisations is subject to the principle of subsidiarity.

A joint youth strategy was developed and introduced by the Federal Government in December 2019. It aims at involving young people in all decisions concerning them. In doing so they are to be offered the best possible conditions to cope with the challenges of this independent phase of life that is youth. The youth strategy is based on the "new youth policy" that has been pursued by the BMFSFJ for some years now. It gives visibility to the common interests of millions of young people and adults aged between 12 and 27.

The federal government's sustainability dialogue platform (Dialog Nachhaltigkeit) included young people and gave them the opportunity to express their ideas and opinions. The new version of the National Sustainable Development Strategy (Deutsche Nachhaltigkeitsstrategie) was then adopted in January 2017 to support the 2030 Agenda (Agenda 2030 für nachhaltige Ziele). The German government also involved the public, including young people aged 18 to 35, both directly and online when developing its Climate Action Plan 2050 (Klimaschutzplan 2050).

The national steering platform for implementing the Global Action Programme Education for Sustainable Development (Weltaktionsprogramm Bildung für nachhaltige Entwicklung) includes an expert forum on non-formal and informal learning/youth consisting of representatives of various youth organisations. The Federal Ministry of Education and Research (Bundesministerium für Bildung und Forschung) has lead responsi-

Consultation processes between the ministries are governed by the Joint Rules of Procedure of the Federal Ministries (Gemeinsame Geschäftsordnung der Bundesministerien, GGO). The ministries are free to choose their own approaches towards addressing, e.g., young people. Youth conferences help support the dialogue with policy-makers, for example the Youth

Germany Germany

Politics Days (Jugendpolitiktage) of the BMFSFJ. At this event, young people meet with politicians and representatives of society to discuss political issues and voice their concerns.

In the past, young Germans have also taken part in the vouth summits organised in the run-up to the G7/G8 and G20 summits. They provided the young generation's perspective on the political agenda at the summits and called for a youth-specific view. In 2022, Germany hosted the Y7 Summit, where young people discussed the following themes: Sustainable & Green Planet, Economic Transformation for Shared Progress, Resilience of Democracies, and Global Health & Solidarity. In June 2019, the Y7 youth summit took place in Paris as the counterpart event of the G7 summit. The young participants from the G7 countries agreed on specific calls for action concerning the Y7 priority themes. The G20 summit took place in Germany in 2017. Young people met up beforehand at the Y20 youth summit in Berlin where they discussed their proposals with former Chancellor Angela Merkel. In 2015, young people from all over the world met for an international Y7 youth summit in Berlin, whose theme was "Responsibility to act" (Verantwortung zu handeln). They discussed what their governments and they personally can do for sustainable development and drafted a position paper with their results, which they presented to and discussed with the then Federal Chancellor Angela Merkel and Federal Minister of Family Affairs, Senior Citizens, Women and Youth Manuela Schwesig.

German youth delegations also take part in the UN Climate Change Conference.

On 20 June 2017, the National Action Plan Education for Sustainable Development (Nationaler Aktionsplan Bildung für nachhaltige Entwicklung) was adopted. It defines 130 objectives to embed education for sustainable development in all areas (formal, non-formal and informal education) and at all levels of the education system.

As part of the European Year of Youth in 2022, the BMFSFI launched the participatory campaign "Your Europe - Your Year!". Young people are called upon to participate in shaping policy, to contribute their own ideas and to become active by, e.g., organising small

discussion groups, larger debates or street actions. The aim is to engage in a conversation about the concerns of young people in Europe and to sensitise decision-makers and the general public to these concerns. The talks are organised by young people, youth groups, youth initiatives, child and youth welfare organisations and many

Funding schemes and support mechanisms/structures

Federal Ministry for Family Affairs, Senior Citizens. Women and Youth / Bundesministerium für Familie, Senioren, Frauen und Jugend (BMFSFJ)

The Federal Ministry for Family Affairs, Senior Citizens, Women and Youth has six Directorates-General that reflect its responsibilities, of which Directorate-General 5 (Children and Youth) is one.

Among other things, the Ministry funds youth organisations and bilateral youth offices in order to strengthen youth exchange and exchange of professionals in the field of youth, mutual understanding and cohesion in Europe (see below).

The "Kinder- und Jugendplan" (Child and Youth Plan) is the most important youth-related financial instrument at the federal level. Funding is provided for projects run by independent organisations that are of importance to Germany as a whole. For example, the Ministry funds youth exchange programmes with a focus on sustainability.

The BMFSFJ funds a major programme for international voluntary services for young people who are resident in Germany (International Youth Volunteer Service / Internationaler Jugendfreiwilligendienst IJFD). With this, young people aged 18-26 years can volunteer for community-oriented projects all over the world, for example in the social or environmental field.

Federal Ministry for Economic Cooperation and Development / Bundesministerium für wirtschaftliche Zusammenarbeit und Entwicklung (BMZ)

The Federal Ministry for Economic Cooperation and Development has two offices in Bonn and Berlin. Some BMZ staff also represent German development policy in German foreign missions or international organisations around the world. The BMZ commissions what are known as implementing organisations to execute its projects. These then work with implementing agencies in the partner countries in question.

The BMZ portfolio includes global pandemic control, climate protection, displacement and migration, and digitalisation. Its work is guided by the 17 Sustainable Development Goals of the United Nations. The most important tasks of German development policy include the global realisation of human rights, the fight against hunger and poverty, the protection of the climate and biodiversity, health and education, gender equality, fair supply chains, the use of digitalisation and technology transfer, and the strengthening of private investment to promote sustainable development worldwide.

One of the many programmes funded and managed by the BMZ is the Federal Government programme "weltwärts". It is managed by Engagement Global on behalf of the BMZ. Engagement Global - Service für Entwicklungsinitiativen (Service for Development Initiatives) is a non-profit limited organisation whose mission is to support and strengthen the commitment to development of civil society. Engagement Global is also in charge of the African-German Youth Office (AGYO) (see below).

weltwärts is a development volunteer service which was launched in 2008 as a volunteering scheme for young people aged between 18 and 28. The current funding regulations describe the objectives and general terms and conditions of the programme, training and guidance, the so-called South-North component (a mechanism to facilitate the placement of volunteers from so-called developing countries in Germany), support activities for volunteers and returnees, and legal and financial matters.

The North-South component is available for assignments in countries on the DAC list of developing countries and regions. In some countries, weltwarts is not available owing to difficult conditions or the security situation on the ground.

The Federal Foreign Office is Germany's foreign ministry. It funds the international

cultural volunteer programme "kulturweit". As part of the German UNESCO commission, it is an international cultural voluntary service that forms part of Germany's foreign culture and education policy. kulturweit offers young people from Germany aged 18 through 26 the opportunity to get involved in Germany's foreign culture and education policy for six or twelve months. During the placement, they directly contribute through their work to cultural and educational institutions as well as UNESCO World Natural Heritage sites, geoparks and biosphere reserves worldwide.

JUGEND für Europa (JfE) is Germany's National Agency for the EU programmes Erasmus+ Youth, Erasmus+ Sport, and European Solidarity Corps. JfE implements and supports projects for child and youth services experts, decision-makers, researchers and young people active in this field. The Agency works on behalf of the Federal Ministry for Family Affairs, Senior Citizens, Women and Youth (BMFSFJ) and the European Commission.

JUGEND für Europa is legally attached to IJAB - International Youth Service of the Federal Republic of Germany (IJAB - Fachstelle für Internationale Jugendarbeit der Bundesrepublik Deutschland e. V.).

Among JfE's areas of activity are:

- Implementing the EU programmes Erasmus+ Youth, Erasmus+ Sport and European Solidarity Corps in Germany
- Promoting youth policy cooperation across Europe
- Supporting the implementation of the EU Youth Strategy in Germany

- Contributing to the development of an Independent Youth Policy
- Contributing to the development of a European Training Strategy
- Designing European schemes for the recognition of non-formal learning achievements
- Contributing to the development of a European approach towards youth work and child and youth services in various thematic fields

The activities of JfE include the use of programme funds to support international youth exchanges, European volunteering activities, young people's initiatives for participation and solidarity, training courses for experts working in non-formal youth education, and the EU youth dialogue between politicians and young people. JfE also provides information about the objectives, opportunities, regulations and priority areas of Erasmus+ Youth and European Solidarity Corps. It advises individuals and organisations active in this field on planning, implementing and developing projects under the Erasmus+ Youth and European Solidarity Corps programmes.

In 2022, JfE provided up to €5,000 per activity in the context of the European Year of Youth.

If E is currently drawing up guidelines with practical tips and suggestions for environmentally and climate-friendly project design with the involvement of experienced organisations and individuals.

JfE supports the German EuroPeers Network, which deals with sustainability and has published a number of articles on this topic (see "Resources" section).

In addition to projects in Germany, the DBU also provides limited funding to international projects, for the time being primarily projects in Central and (South) Eastern Europe. The FGYO is an international organisation for Franco-German cooperation. The founding of the FGYO goes back to the Franco-German friendship agreement (Elysée Treaty) of 1963. Its mission is to strengthen ties between German and French young people and to deepen their sense of mutual understanding. Since 1963, more than 9.5 million young people from France and Germany have participated in over 382,000 exchange programmes.

The FGYO supports youth exchange and youth projects between Germany and France. Projects include student exchanges for secondary schools and universities, language courses, town twinning arrangements and regional partnerships, sports meetings, internships and exchanges in the field of career and seminar and research grants. For instance, under the call for projects "The planet in your hands", a total of 19 projects are supported in 2022 that focus on the climate/environment/sustainability nexus and have a Franco-German or multilateral dimension.

15% of FGYO funds are invested in trilateral programmes. In 1976, the FGYO began to expand its activities to neighbouring countries in Central and South-Eastern Europe as well as the Mediterranean. The FGYO receives special funding from both Ministries for Foreign Affairs.

Erasmus by Train raises awareness among Erasmus+ participants about sustainable travel in Europe. The initiative supports Erasmus+ participants who want to travel by coach or train and also provides grants if the budget is available. Moreover, Erasmus by Train is lobbying the relevant authorities at university, regional, national and European level.

Eurodesk Germany c/o IJAB e.V. -**LEMOCC** partner

Eurodesk is a European information network with coordination centres in 37 countries and over 1,000 local service points. In Germany, Eurodesk works with around 50 regional and local partners. The aim of the network is to facilitate access to Europe and the world for young people and youth work multipliers. Eurodesk Germany informs professionals working with young people about national and European funding programmes in the fields of Europe, youth, mobility, sustainability, education, culture and sports. Eurodesk advises young people on different ways to go abroad, e.g., voluntary services, international youth exchanges, workcamps, jobs and internships abroad. Eurodesk Germany can also point out sustainable or ecological international options. > The German Federal Youth Council is a large network of youth organisations and regional (state) youth councils (Landesjugendringe) in Germany. Around six million children and adolescents are members of youth organisations and youth councils. DBJR is active in the fields of

European and international youth policy and cultivates partnerships with youth councils in other countries, for example France, Israel and Poland. DBJR is also active in the field of sustainability, climate change and environmental protection. DBJR regularly publishes position papers that reflect youth-specific political resolutions on many current topics. In December 2019 it adopted a position paper entitled Ensure international youth work, which states that youth associations want to enable climate-friendly travel but must also be adequately equipped for this purpose. DBJR claims that one criterion for funding the cost of travel must be climate-friendliness, not the price of the means of transport. The cost of climate-friendly means of travel should be fully covered.



Project: International youth exchange

Countries: Germany and Poland

Organisation(s): Ludwigstein Youth Meeting House (Germany); Panorama of Cultures Association (Poland); LAB XXI Foundation (Poland)

Description: What exactly is sustainability and how does it relate to me? These were the questions to be explored by the participants. During the first meeting in Germany, young people learned about the multiple aspects of the concept, including the ecological dimension, the system of global dependencies, and social aspects. They prepared short films on each of these aspects and thought about actions to take in their neighbourhoods. The second meeting took place in Poland and was dedicated to personal commitment to sustainable development. In between meetings, the young people conducted information campaigns and surveys and prepared petitions on cycle path networks and fair trade products, which they submitted to representatives of relevant institutions during the second meeting. Throughout the project, participants put the idea of sustainable development into practice. In addition, they created scenarios for individual parts of the projects in Polish and German, which were made available to the organisers of future exchanges.

Description: The central theme of the international exchange programme was the joint development of a circus and theatre performance in daily workshops. By exploring different forms of artistic expression and throughout the entire process, the children were allowed as much participation as possible. Another goal of the exchange programme was to address other issues, such as the finite nature of resources, sustainable resource use, the importance of democratic processes, and gender equality. The topic of environmental protection was actively introduced by the children themselves and became a central theme of the performance. The value of democratic processes for a harmonious community, in which everyone regardless of their abilities and needs is heard and respected, was demonstrated practically by living it together. The menu was dominated by vegetarian food, leading to conversations about a more sustainable lifestyle. The children, almost all of them from villages, were naturally interested in avoiding food waste.

The participants developed a simulation game concept on sustainable lifestyles. Back home, the participants played the simulation game four times in teams of two. This way, around 760 young people participated in the game during the project period. The ideas developed during the game were documented and discussed with local politicians and civil society groups. The experiences gained were incorporated in the final simulation game concept, which was then published in English, Russian, Serbian, Turkish and German. The resulting set of materials enables other organisations and institutions to play the simulation game, too. Through media coverage of the project, many people learned about sustainability issues.



Policy developments

In Türkiye, it is well known that climate and youth mobility have been a priority in EU Green Deal programmes and Erasmus+ projects for many years. However, the focus of youth policy in Türkiye has always been its policies aimed at strengthening youth. In this context, policy measures and objectives for strengthening youth are designed to include all dimensions, situations and future projections of a young person's life. This comprehensive point of view for strengthening youth is apparent in the policy fields of Türkiye's National Youth and Sports Policy Document. They are: Education and Lifelong Learning, Ethics and Humanitarian Values, Employment and Entrepreneurship, Disadvantaged Youth and Social Inclusion, Health and Environment, Democratic Participation and Citizenship Consciousness, Culture and Art, Science and Technology, Youth in the International Arena, Using Leisure Time, Informing the Youth, and Volunteering and Mobility.

Türkiye has adopted a Climate Change Strategy for the period 2010 to 2030 which aims to help combat climate change within the framework of "common but differentiated responsibilities" to the extent its capacities allow, which is one of the main principles of the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change. The Strategy also defines the country's mitigation, adaptation, technology, financing and capacity generation policies. It has developed various action plans and strategies in climate and related fields. Civil society initiatives for young people on climate change come under what is known as an "Initiative of Youth Participation in Climate Change Policies in Türkiye" (Youth for Climate for short), which aims to bring together different youth groups so they can become an independent, collective pressure/lobby group to call upon Türkiye to adopt a fair, realistic and sustainable climate policy at COPs of critical importance. The Initiative held its first meeting in September 2009 in Ankara, which was attended by approximately 30 young people. After this meeting, it was decided to establish an initiative and develop activities in preparation for COP 15 in 2009 in Copenhagen. Youth for Climate, which was established in June 2009 ahead of the Copen-

hagen Summit by a group of university students and recent graduates interested in climate policy, attended the Copenhagen Summit and published a daily bulletin. The group played an active role in the establishment of 350 Ankara and in organising the first 350.org actions, and also ran the campaign for the Copenhagen Summit together. The group organised an activity in November 2009 in Kuğulu Park entitled "Heat the Soup, not the Nature". The group connected remotely via a live link to METU's (Middle East Technical University) Environmental Engineering Department and provided information about the summit. Youth for Climate also prepared a booklet about climate justice named "After all, it is the End of the World" that was distributed at the European Social Forum in Istanbul. The group is presently not active.

A climate simulation programme took place in İzmir and Ankara to introduce young climate leaders to the Change for Climate (C4C) project. The programme was open to members of non-governmental organisations and university students under the age of 35 and simulated the youngsters' participation in United Nations Climate Change negotiations. Young people also participated in simulated UNFCCC summits such as World Climate and World Energy that were developed by the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) and Climate Interactive, and in simulations of inter-sectoral global meetings for the reduction of greenhouse gases. They participate in workshops on climate-related issues to help change public opinion, such as global warming, carbon footprint, climate justice, low carbon economy and 2100 global temperature projections.

Participatory Climate Change Action Plan consultation meetings were held in April 2018 with both stakeholders and Kadıköy residents so goals could be set and a roadmap developed for the Kadıköy Municipality Climate Change Action Plan. In this context, training was given to 150 young volunteers aged 18 to 29 especially on combating climate change and adapting to climate change in cities. It aimed to help the young people in this neighbourhood to become resistant to the negative effects of climate change. Also, a sustainable training

programme was developed for children aged 3 to 6, and awareness training was given to four thousand children in kindergarten (Kadıköy Municipality, 2018).

Funding schemes and support mechanisms/structures

Targets and measures for youth participation in the international arena and increasing awareness of youth of global problems are included in the policy section, entitled "Youth in the International Arena", of the National Youth and Sports Policy Document. Along with public authorities, independent non-governmental organisations and universities also play an important role in supporting young people's participation in international cooperation and decision-making mechanisms. Joint youth projects carried out by the Ministry of Youth and Sports in cooperation with other countries and joint support for civil youth initiatives are an important part of what the Ministry of Youth and Sports is doing to build young people's awareness of global problems. International youth camps organised by the Ministry of Further information: Petition for a Carbon-Free Future Youth and Sports help raise young people's international awareness. Furthermore, within the scope of the Youth Project Support Programme of the Ministry of Youth and Sports, non-governmental organisations are supported in enabling young people to explore other youth work channels in the international arena. They are also put in a position to establish cooperation with other non-governmental organisations in the international arena.

"Think Civil" in Türkiye and EU offices hosts and organises Erasmus+ projects that enable youth mobility around environment & sustainability. To participate in Think Civil, young people must draft a project proposal that describes the intended activities and apply for funding.





Policy developments

According to the Sustainable Development Report 2022, UK ranks 11th out of 163 countries in the SDG Index.

The SDGs have been integrated into sectoral action plans but national indicators have not been identified to monitor the implementation of the SDGs. Also, there is no lead government unit for the coordination and implementation of the SDGs across ministries.

In 2020, the British government announced that its national climate crisis strategy aimed at six strategic priorities which would enable the UK to reach net zero by 2050. The plan stated that "rapid and unprecedented action" would be required to effect change. According to the report Decarbonising Transport, providing people with the right amount of information on the environmental impact of their journeys could help them change their habits. If the public can "access clear, transparent information about the emissions associated with their journeys, then this will enable more informed decisions about how individuals and goods travel," states the report.

In November 2021, the UK convened COP26 in Glasgow and held the COP Presidency until COP27. At COP26, the Glasgow Climate Pact was adopted, urging parties and stakeholders "to ensure meaningful youth participation and representation in multilateral, national and local decision-making processes, including under the Convention and the Paris Agreement", underlining the role of youth and the need to include them in climate change instances at all levels.

Numerous studies around the topics of young people, nature and mobility have been carried out in the UK. Findings of the research project Children's Attitudes to Sustainable Transport, for example, highlight a need for general travel awareness campaigns that should carry environmental, social, health and lifestyle messages that appeal to young people. According to the Children's

People and Nature Survey, over 80% of young people aged 8 to 15 are eager to take action to help the environment

Since the UK left the European Union on 31 January 2020, there have been many changes in the way UK youngsters can benefit from the EU programmes. The UK has left the Erasmus+ programme, and as a consequence, the European Solidarity Corps too.

Funding schemes and support mechanisms/structures

The **Department for Digital, Culture, Media and Sport (DCMS)** is responsible for out-of-school youth policy and programmes, supporting the youth sector in delivering high quality services to young people, and funding the National Citizen Service (NCS) programme. DCMS across its sectors is investing in and expanding opportunities for young people to engage in sport, arts, heritage and digital activities.



Back to Green Land

Project: International youth exchange

Description: The project "Back To Green Land" lasted a total of ten months (from May 2019 to March 2020), with a period of eight days dedicated to the activities. Project activities were implemented in Kangerlussuaq, Greenland. The idea and initiative of "Back to Green Land" originated with young people who raised awareness amongst their peers about existing climate change and strengthened their realisation of how this significant threat is facing the entire planet. The project stimulated young people to understand the importance of protection in small communities whilst becoming globally aware of environmental issues. The methods underlying the activities of this youth exchange came from the non-formal education field and assured that the desired results would be obtained through the project.

Balwearie High School: Innovative and Entrepreneurial Solutions to Climate Change

Project: Strategic partnership on "Innovative and Entrepreneurial Solutions to Climate Change"

Countries: Finland, Germany, Scotland

Description: This project, highly relevant to current concerns over climate change and sustainability, involved students creating novel and entrepreneurial ways to tackle these issues, for instance conducting surveys, completing scientific research projects and studying national and EU policies promoting sustainable and renewable energy solutions. As well as increasing pupils and staff's knowledge on the effects of pollution and global warming on the environment, the project gave pupils the skills they would need to follow their education and career paths. All participating pupils were granted the John Muir award through achieving the four challenges: discover a wild place, explore it, conserve it, and share the experience. Staff also benefitted, developing innovative approaches to teaching and learning and sharing pedagogy across different educational regions within Europe.


